## Numbers Station (Cynthia)

for two or more performers

## General Approach

Numbers Station (Cynthia) translates dates into sonic gestures.

## Duration and Timing

Duration of the piece is variable. Typical performances last between 6 and 10 minutes.

## Before performance

Choose two different dates of significance to you or those close to you (for example: birth date, anniversary, death date, incarceration date, release date, etc.). Today's date is always significant. Write the dates on the Today's Special page, paying attention to the proper order of the digits. Consult the appropriate Number to Pitch Chart for your instrument to write the corresponding pitch for each digit in the dates. Choose an appropriate clef and register for your instrument in order to preserve the melodic contour of the pitches. See Today's Special Example.

## Performance Instructions

The movements are played in the following order:

- Flourish
- Announcement
- Flourish
- Today's Special
- Flourish
- Announcement
- Flourish

The complete sequence of movements must be played at least once but may be played as many times as desired. Except for the Announcement movement-which requires a consistent, shared pulse-performers are not generally synchronized with each other. Each performer proceeds at their own pace, adjusting their pace or lengths of rests to stay near the other ensemble members.

## Ending the Piece

When performers are ready to end the piece, they signal each other during the last announcement section. A designated ensemble member will then cue the flourish at the end and provide a final cutoff. It's not necessary to wait for everyone to complete their final announcement section-any suitable ending point will do.

## Metaphors

- Performers act as radio stations transmitting coded information into the ether. The listeners' experience is similar to tuning between multiple radio stations. It is not necessary to understand the content of the message to appreciate its quality.
- The musical material reflects the quotidian events recorded in a journal. The performance brings attention to this fleeting everydayness, making it special.


## Suggestions for Performances

- To commemorate a person or event, all performers may choose dates related to the person or event.
- All performers may choose the date of the performance for one of their significant dates.
- Performers may get a glimpse of the future by choosing a date that has not occurred yet.
- Performers may choose to use a non-Gregorian calendar system for their dates.


## For A Good Performance of This Piece

- Play less and rest more! Respect the duration of rests. Use a variety of rest lengths between movements and phrases. Allow space for other sounds to be heard.
- The Flourish, Announcement and Today's Special movements should be easily distinguished from each other.


## Program Notes

Numbers Station (Cynthia) is inspired by mysterious radio broadcasts that consist of repeated lists of numbers or letters. These stations are usually broadcast on shortwave radio frequencies and are thought to be maintained by diplomatic and spy agencies as a way to send messages to agents in the field. Some station's codes have been partially decrypted. A typical message sequence consists of a number that identifies which agent should receive the message, followed by a number that denotes the date of the message and a number that represents the length of the message. After the message is sent, another set of numbers-often reversed-confirms the end of the transmission. Cynthia is the nickname for a station thought to be maintained by the CIA. It featured a female voice with an American accent reading sequences of numbers. It was last heard in 2003.

## Announcement



Beginning when ready, play gestures corresponding to the digits in your dates in the order: Date 1: YYYYMMDD Date 2: DDMMYYYY. Maintain a consistent, shared pulse throughout the movement. Choose any octave suitable for your instrument for the entire movement. Rests at the end of each phrase may be any length such that the beginning of the next phrase always occurs on a downbeat.
